## PERSONA DESCRIPTION

Mostafa, 55, male, married – Country of training –Professor in Egypt with 25 years of experience as a vitreo-retinal sub specialist ophthalmologist. He did not have all the required paperwork for verification and had to return to his country of training to source relevant documents. He was lucky enough to connect with an old mentor in his home country who assisted with finding the relevant paperwork and helped him deal with administration. He was deemed partially comparable and required to sit specialist college exams which focused on general ophthalmic content. He was required to do some workplace-based assessments and supervised training to prepare for the advanced clinical examination but failed the specialist college exams on several occasions - struggled with generalist knowledge. The College allowed only one sitting of the exam. He has not given up on his plan to practice in Australia as a medical doctor and is currently studying for the AMC MCQ examination. The financial burden of immigration and international medical graduate assessment is proving challenging because his savings, which are in Egyptian pounds, are worth less in exchange with Australian dollars (AUD). He was separated from his family for a time but is now reunited – they now live in WA in a metro area. Mostafa can't understand why he needs to restart his career rather than have his prior experience acknowledged and accredited in a context of work shortages in medicine.
