PERSONA DESCRIPTION

Luis, 55, male, divorced. Country of Training – Surgeon from Brazil. Originally came to Australia for a better life and to practice medicine with more work life balance. He was deemed non comparable in the specialist pathway and then applied for the AMC standard pathway. He struggled to pass the clinical AMC exam and stopped at eight attempts. He had particular challenges with command of the English language. He had gaps in knowledge: health system, mental health, women's health, paediatrics, internal medicine, Indigenous health and diverse communities and cultural values. He applied, but couldn't get a place in a WBA program. He had limited registration and could not secure employment as a doctor. He is currently earning well in a digital health corporate role in Melbourne but missing his vocation and rues skill wastage to the system. The challenges he experienced caused disharmony in his family and resulted in a divorce. He would like to see improvements to assessment pathways and employment opportunities for international medical graduates.
